## Honoring Telecommunications Access of Maryland's (TAM) First Director, Willis Mann



Please join the TAM team as we honor the late Willis Mann, the first director of TAM and one of the trailblazers who helped found Maryland Relay. Willis passed away on Friday, March 31, 2023, at the age of 82.

During his lifetime, Willis was dedicated to supporting and serving the Deaf community in many impactful ways. This life goal began after he earned a bachelor's degree in English from Gallaudet University in 1967 and then a master's degree in vocational rehabilitation from the University of Maryland in 1969. He even returned to Gallaudet University later in life to serve as an adjunct professor of public speaking.

In addition to working at Gallaudet University, Willis served as the first director of Northern California's Sacramento Relay program and then the first executive director of the NorCal Center on Deafness (now NorCal Services for Deaf and Hard of Hearing). He then left the State of California

to come to the State of Maryland to interview for the TAM director role in 1988, when it was known as the Telecommunications for Disabled Individuals Program. Willis was chosen out of 28 applicants, and he quickly began his mission to help launch TAM and MRS, which is now known as Maryland Relay, to the public—providing Marylanders who are Deaf and hard of hearing with the ability to communicate over the phone. Willis is survived by his wife of 56 years, Jackie, and their children Erik Robert and Kristin Todd Mann, grandson Gavin Foster Mann, sister Shirley Kaczmark of Cloquet, Minnesota, and brother Paul Mann of Lakeville, Minnesota. He was preceded in death by his parents, his sister, and his brother.

## Helping MAT Customers Find Solutions That Meet Their Needs

This spring, MAT Evaluator Brenda Bush shared a touching story with the TAM team that truly captures why the MAT program is such a beneficial resource for Marylanders who depend on assitive telecommunications equipment to make and receive calls.

"On April 12, I spent most of the day programming a RAZ Memory Cell Phone for a client with low vision and speech difficulties. This device is not just for people with memory loss it can be used by people who have low vision and want to make limited calls. This particular device was loaned to the client because he has macular degeneration and he only needs a phone to contact his wife, son, daughter, and 9-1-1.

When I delivered the phone, we sat together and tested all of the buttons, practiced using Speech-to-Speech, and made a call to 9-1-1 to ensure operators knew the client has speech difficulties. After helping the client, I showed his wife an app called Seeing Al—which voices content that's captured by a phone's camera and helped her download it onto her iPhone. The client's wife began to cry because she was so happy that her husband can now be independent with his own phone."

## Popular Shows Shine the Spotlight on the Deaf Community

Are you a fan of pop culture? If so, you might be familiar with some of the TV shows that have recently been attracting heavy media attention due to the incredible actors and actresses from the Deaf community and the increase of ASL on viewers' screens.

#### **Ginny and Georgia**

Season two of *Ginny and Georgia*, one of Netflix's hit TV shows, premiered on the popular streaming platform on January 5, 2023, and skyrocketed to number one for four weeks in the United States. Two of the show's main characters, twins Marcus and Maxine Baker, are raised by their mother, Ellen, and their father, Clint. Clint is Deaf in the show and in real life, and his character is portrayed by actor Chris Kenopic. All of the scenes that feature the Bakers show conversations in ASL, representing real families who use ASL each day to communicate with their loved ones.

#### **Dancing with the Stars**

Any Dancing with the Stars enthusiasts out there? The show's 31st season streamed on Disney+ from September 19, 2022, to November 21, 2022, and featured a range of celebrity icons competing with professional dancing partners for the Mirror Ball trophy. One of the contestants, Daniel Durant, is an actor from the Deaf community who is most known for his role in the Academy Award-winning film, *CODA*. Throughout the season, Daniel shared what it was like to be Deaf and compete as a dancer on the show. Daniel and his partner, Britt Stewart, ended up placing fifth out of 18 couples.

#### The Last of Us

A Maryland resident and 10-year-old hockey player, Keivonn Montreal Woodard, had his big acting debut in HBO Max's hit series, *The Last of Us*, which premiered on January 15, 2023. In the show, Keivonn portrays the character Sam Burrell who is Deaf, and Keivonn is also Deaf in real life. In addition to acting, he plays for the Bowie Hockey Club Under-10 team with an ASL interpreter that's supported by a grant from the Washington Capitals and Monumental Sports & Entertainment Foundation's Capital Impact Fund. The hockey player-turned-actor was able to meet and play with members of the Capitals in March of 2023.





## **Could You Benefit from Relay Conference Captioning (RCC)?**

Imagine being on a conference call for work and not being able to follow the conversation because you're living with hearing loss and accessibility features aren't available for the meeting. This is a real occurrence for many people in the world who are Deaf or hard of hearing.

With RCC, individuals with hearing loss can communicate effectively during conference calls, virtual meetings, or webinars. The free service, offered exclusively from Maryland Relay to Maryland residents provides real-time captioning of what all participants are saying during conference calls, virtual meetings, or webinars—allowing the user to read the text on an internet-connected device. The captioning is made possible through the use of Communication Access Realtime Translation (CART) service.



If you need to schedule or request a captionist for your next conference call, virtual meeting, or webinar, please visit MarylandRCC.com and submit the RCC Scheduling Request Form 48 hours in advance of the call.

#### Here's What You Need to Know About RCC and How It Works:

- No special software is required to use RCC; however, you must have access to a computer or mobile device that has internet connection to view the link where your text conversation will appear.
- Using a method such as a conference call bridge, your captionist will listen to the audio portion of the conference call, virtual meeting, or webinar and type real-time text, which displays seconds after someone has spoken.
- At any time, you may scroll up and view what has been said during the conversation by any member of the conference call, virtual meeting, or webinar
- Once the call is completed, you have the ability to copy or print the transcript that was produced by the captionist during the call.
- To guarantee RCC service, you must submit the RCC Scheduling Request Form 48 hours in advance of the call—which can be found at MarylandRCC.com.
